

CONFERENCE POLICIES

BEHAVIOR IN COMMITTEE

Throughout any conference hosted by Model United Nations of the Far West, Inc. ("MUNFW"), all participants, including delegates, faculty advisors, volunteers, and those associated with MUNFW will be required to demonstrate professional behavior and decorum and adhere to the policies of the organization.

When a committee is in session, delegates must properly represent the country in the committee's work to promote the country's interests and values in an effort to achieve its policy goals. Delegates may negotiate policies through debate, bargaining, and consensus, but should make every effort to ensure that their country's policy objectives are reflected in a committee's outcome documents.

Debate at MUNFW is between delegations and nations. Protocol requires that delegates address or refer to other delegates by referencing the Member State that they represent (Such as, "the delegate from ____.") Policy criticism is addressed to the nation, not the delegate. Derogatory remarks directed to a delegate or delegation are unacceptable behavior and are prohibited at MUNFW.

Rules and procedures exist to facilitate the orderly flow of business in a committee, council, etc. Use of the rules to hinder this flow, if not in keeping with a country's policy on the issue, will be ruled out of order. A delegate may challenge the chair's decision to rule a motion out of order, but such challenge must be in writing and directed to the Secretary-General only. The committee shall continue its work while waiting for a ruling from the Secretary-General.

DELEGATE ATTENDANCE

Attendance at all meetings during a conference is vital to achieving the benefits of the MUNFW experience. Part of that attendance is being on time, paying attention to conference and committee business, and contributing to debate and the development of a committee's outcome documents.

It is the policy of MUNFW that Member Schools and Delegates shall observe the starting and stopping times posted by the Secretariat in the conference schedule. The practice of suspending the work of a committee prior to the stated times shall be discouraged unless the committee has completed its agenda.



CONFERENCE POLICIES

DRESS CODE

Preferred attire for committees shall be standard western business dress. Delegates may wear a jacket and tie with appropriate shirt and pants. Sweaters are acceptable in place of jackets and ties. Delegates may also wear dresses, skirts or pants with appropriate blouses. Sheer clothing should be avoided. No jeans or athletic wear, sneakers, T-shirts, or shorts will be allowed to be worn in committees.

ALCOHOL AND SUBSTANCE USE POLICY

MUNFW prohibits at all times the presence or consumption of alcohol in committee rooms or at the diplomats' banquet. MUNFW prohibits the unlawful use of controlled substances during the conference. When committees are not in session, MUNFW participants may consume alcoholic beverages in a manner that is responsible and adheres to restrictions imposed by law and respective participants' school standards of conduct.

ACCESSIBILITY AND REASONABLE ACCOMMODATION

MUNFW is committed to welcoming people of all abilities, and regularly engages with the conference site to ensure compliance with State and Federal accessibility standards. Conference participants are encouraged to consult with their college Disability Services office regarding resources their institution may have in order to provide reasonable accommodations. KEYNOTE SPEAKER - MR. BRIAN GORLICK



Brian Gorlick worked with the Office of the High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) and UN Secretariat in a number of senior positions for twenty-seven years. With UNHCR he served in Türkiye, India, Sweden, New York, the Caribbean, Bangladesh, Malaysia, and the Department of International Protection at Headquarters in Geneva. He has been on mission to some forty countries around the globe. Prior to joining the UN, Brian worked as legal counsel in the areas of immigration, refugee, and administrative law in Toronto.

He holds degrees from the University of Winnipeg (BA), York University (MA), Osgoode Hall Law School (JD), and the London School of Economics and Political Science (LLM, with distinction) and was called to the Ontario Bar. For several years Brian was Policy Developments Editor of the International Journal of Refugee Law (Oxford University Press). He has published dozens of articles on international and comparative refugee and human rights law, gender rights, immigration and national security, global administrative law and has lectured and taught at university and training institutions in Asia, Europe, and North America.

In addition to teaching on the MA course, Brian is Senior Research Associate at the Refugee Law Initiative and is currently engaged in consultancy and volunteer work on international public law and promotion of refugee and migrant rights.
